**The Baptism of the Lord**

**Reading I: Isaiah 42: 1-4, 6-7, or 55: 1-11**

God speaks as He would to a heavenly court, and promises that He will give His Spirit to the coming Messiah. We also learn about the power of God's Word, which never goes unfulfilled. The Messiah will be "a light to all nations."

**Reading II: Acts 10: 34-38, or I John 5: 1-9**

This letter of John joins obedience to love. It is incumbent on us to believe that Jesus is the Son of the Father, and that His death for sin brings us eternal life.

**The Gospel: Mark 1: 7-11**

John the Baptist again exhibits his humility before Jesus, as he declares himself unworthy to do what was normally a slave's task: loosening Jesus' sandal straps. "Wind and fire" describe the coming of the kingdom and precede the proclamation of Our Lord's true identity.

## FISCAL CORNER

As of week 14, with 3 weeks left of the Parish appeal, 319 families have contributed \$127,315.71 toward our goal of \$150,000. We are at 84.88% of this year's goal and are \$5,650 behind last year's pace. We ask that you please consider a gift towards this most important appeal!

This is one of our largest sources of income, aside from our normal Sunday collections, and is greatly needed for the daily operation of our parish. We are seeing a small decrease in our total Sunday collections as well as facing a shortfall in the school due to Covid remediation. Additional cost for cleaning and sanitizing, additional staff for remediation, supplies and signage, as well as the reduction in enrollment in our PreK program will result in a larger than average parish subsidy. If you can help with this effort, it would be greatly appreciated! You should have received our appeal materials in the mail. If you have not, there are appeal envelopes located in the entrances of the church. Please return your donation by placing this year's appeal envelope in the collection basket at Mass, mail your contribution or drop it off directly to the rectory. ## ADULT Faith FORMATION

Today is the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Baptism is the Christian rite of admission and adoption into Christianity. It is understood to be the annulment of the sins of one's past and the emergence of a totally innocent person. So, if Christ was born without sin and never committed sin, why did He have to be baptized. Well, He didn't 'need' to but as Jesus responded to John the Baptist 'let it be so, for it is fitting in this way for us to fulfill all righteousness' (Matt 3:15). Jesus is fulfilling His role as the obedient Son of God by practicing the required righteousness of submitting to God's will to repent (i.e. live in the world wholeheartedly devoted to God). He also 'received' the Holy Spirit, the Lord and Giver of life, the love between the Father and the Son. Jesus was fully human and fully divine. Righteousness refers to the whole-person behavior that accords to God's will, nature and coming kingdom. Repentance here means to become a disciple in that Jesus is dedicating Himself to follow God's will fully on earth. Let us take the opportunity to celebrate our own baptism, dedicate ourselves to God's will and repent and become one of His disciples and follow Jesus' example. Men of St. Ignatius, join us this Wed. ### **ECONOMIC RESOURCES:**

**Pennsylvania Unemployment Compensation:** You may be eligible for unemployment if your employer has closed due to COVID-19, your hours have been reduced, you have been told not to work, you have been laid off, or have been told to isolate or self-quarantine. Self-employed, independent contractors and freelancers also may be eligible for unemployment assistance through the Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA program) for up to 50 weeks total through mid-March, 2021.

Important to note, under the federal economic stimulus law just enacted in December, state unemployment benefits are increased by up to \$300/week for 11 weeks. However, it may take a few weeks for the enhanced benefit to appear in unemployment compensation.

**Direct Cash Payments:** Under the new federal economic stimulus law you may be eligible for a second stimulus check: you will receive a direct payment of \$600 if you earned \$75,000 or less in 2019, or \$1,200 if you and your spouse make up to \$150,000, and an extra \$600 per dependent child (up to age 16). Payments will decrease if you made over \$75,000, and will phase out completely if your income was over \$87,000 that year.

Electronic payments are expected to be received as soon as the beginning of January, but if mailed, receipt will take longer.

### **HOUSING RESOURCES:**

**Eviction Moratorium:** The federal eviction moratorium has been extended to Jan. 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021.
